LABELING YOUR QUILT

Preserve the heritage of your quilts for future generations while expressing your creativity with labels. Adding a label to your quilt is the finishing touch. How many quilts are now anonymous, because we don't know when, where, and by whom they were made? A securely attached label is a message for the future as well as identifying the quilt today. It can also help identify your quilt if it is lost or stolen.

Here are some ideas for what to include on the label:

- who made the quilt
- who quilted the quilt
- the quilt pattern name
- date and place where it was completed
- whom the quilt was given to
- the occasion, such as a graduation, retirement, or anniversary, that prompted the making of the quilt
- care instructions

Here are some ideas for making a quilt label:

- Draw or embroider the words and add embellishments, such as vines, flowers, or French knots.
- Incorporate one or more extra blocks from the quilt top into the label.
- For a framed finish, bind the label edges like a mini quilt. Sew leftover binding from the quilt around the label edges, then turn the binding over the edge to the wrong side. Hand-stitch the bound label to the backing, taking care not to stitch through to the top.
- To ensure a label can't easily be removed from the quilt, stitch the label to the backing fabric and quilt through it.
- Quilt labels can also be printed on your computer using Computer Printer Fabric which is available at quilt and fabric stores.
